The problems our planet faces today are more than a consequence of bad behaviour. At their root is a crisis of human values.

The latest predictions of climate change and damage to ecosystems mean that we have less than a decade to take up the challenge of rapid, thorough and lasting transformation. We have left it so late that the challenge is now beyond normal human capacities.

Our faith is a gift we ordinary Christians can make in these extraordinary times. It is time for an ecological conversion.

We are social animals and must make this exodus together. That is why CEL seeks to become, in the words of Jim Wallis, 'an alternative community, living a new way of life, visibly demonstrating the values of Jesus and the kingdom of God'.

It is not just CEL which believes that the environmental movement needs a new direction. A recent WWF report, Weathercocks and Signposts, criticises environmental campaigns which appeal to our society's individualism and materialism, when they should be dismantling them. It says that any strategy which does not challenge those prevailing values is doomed to fail.

What are the values which should take their place? Here we offer our reflections on just two possibilities: wonder and love. You may want to suggest others. Join us in finding the good news for our time.

### George says ...

Since becoming a Christian 15 years ago I had found a huge mismatch between my long-held 'secular' passion for the environment and my faith. No Christians ever seemed to mention care for the earth, at least not in the way in which I understood it. The inevitable result was that I kept both these parts of my life separate – which often felt very uncomfortable. Discovering CEL has enabled these seemingly conflicting areas to fall into place. It continues to provide a supportive and creative community of fellow Christians who are working together to share ideas, resources and activities with which I can raise awareness in my own church.

### Wonder

Our capacity for wonder goes beyond simple awareness of our creatureliness before God our Creator. It combines our sense of 'beauty' and our sense of joy in Creation in all its richness, as well as our awareness of the darker side of human nature and existence. So human wonder includes elements of appreciation and celebration, horror and fear. Often it is through participation in liturgy that our wonder is cultivated. As we lift up all of Creation to God in worship we recall the victims of ecocide and 're-member' ourselves as part of the living Earth. Through our collective re-membering, a change in our way of life becomes possible.

### Love

In CEL we are learning to love Creation as gift, as it is in itself, and as an expression of the love of God. The Earth has value in and of itself. We do not manage or steward the Earth for human benefit alone. Rather, in quiet moments we can let the Earth be, and listen for what the voice of Creation might be saying. Because the Earth is the Lord's, the more open we are to the fulness of life in the Holy Spirit, the more we find ourselves determined to protect the natural world. The glory of God is revealed in the cosmos fully alive.

Inside we show how CEL is seeking to grow as a community rooted in the values of the gospel.

### Ellen says ...

The CEL community offers hope and solidarity to me. When it was founded in the 1980s, very few church people were interested in environmental justice, and it was literally a lifeline that there were individuals and groups out there who valued the natural world and saw its destruction as being sinful. The wonderful website, maintained with such vision and commitment, offers an invaluable diary of events and resources which raises awareness, offers liturgy ideas, and explores creation theology. The CEL network is truly an inclusive and holistic community which is a beacon for the churches regarding the new ecological realities of our time.

### Nourishing a new creation

Interconnection lies at the heart of our faith. In the Trinity, no less, we discover that God is community. CEL helps people to restore some of this connectedness to the broken world in which we live. Here are some of the ways in which we are trying to rebuild the connections once more.



### Prayer

In prayer we celebrate the presence of Christ in the midst of Creation. We acknowledge Christ's redeeming power for all brokenness, including sinful humanity.

Our inherited patterns of prayer can seem a feeble response to the devastation around us, and to our own contributions to the tragedy. Much corporate prayer in our churches ignores the needs of Creation altogether.

CEL's Community of Prayer invites you to participate in a regular time for prayer, offers an online forum for sharing prayers, and provides a prayer guide. Praying for the Earth can feel lonely and daunting at times. As a member of the CEL Prayer Community you will find the support of fellow members.

### Churches

Many of us belong to a worshipping community. But we may also long for our congregations to discover the fulness of our Christian witness to the Earth. It can be frustrating to see the indifference or scepticism of our fellow believers. You may feel called to challenge the status quo, suffering the discomfort of staying put and yet feeling 'on the edge'. You might feel drawn to another church where people see things the way you do.

CEL has a special role to help you stick with a congregation which doesn't 'get it'. We will offer you the support you need to keep a clear vision and a courageous heart, and, when the time is right for your church, provide the resources for learning and change. It is our hope that all churches will encourage members and the wider community of which they are a part to act in ways that reflect ecological integrity. As local collective groups, churches do have the power to effect change.

### Localities

As Christians we are challenged to embrace both the global and the local. It is only in the small changes to our own lives and in the world about us the kingdom of God is realised.

Some of our members, for instance, are involved in the Transition Town movement. Others may work to preserve a local wildlife site. Yet others may be active in politics. Whatever your interests and affiliations, in CEL you can help your response take shape according to the needs of your own locality, and your experience of the place where you live.

### CEL's Prayer Guide

Our Prayer Guide for the Care of Creation will not tell you how to pray, but it will give you thought-provoking insights into our predicament, and enable you to make your own response. Here is a typical day's entry from a recent issue.

The Earth is covered, on average, with just three feet of topsoil, the layer that provides most of the world's food crops. Healthy topsoil is home to billions of beneficial microorganisms per handful plus the nutrients, fungi and worms that are critical to healthy plant life. Topsoil forms at a rate of 1-2 inches per several hundred years. The US National Academy of Sciences estimates that cropland is eroding at 10 times the rate that it forms. Pollution, changing weather patterns and urban development are all contributors to topsoil loss. But, according to John Reganold of Washington State University, the worst culprit is modern agricultural practices.

At first people refuse to believe that a strange new thing can be done. Then they begin to hope it can be done. Then they see it can be done. Then it is done, and the world wonders why it was not done.


### Online

# Nazareth earth community – Jesus' ecosystem

With imagination we may place ourselves in hilly Nazareth with its few hundred families and their sheep and goats, oxen, cattle and donkeys. In those green and brown and stony hills, we may imaginatively observe the growing Jesus (Luke 2.40, 52) learning, especially from his mother, about the useful elder trees, the scattered Tabor oaks and Aleppo pine, the nettle, bramble, mallow, and startling yellow chrysanthemums of April, the galaxy of weeds and herbs and wild flowers which later he compared to Solomon's attire. Grapes grow and grew in Nazareth's old town, their branches nourished by the everlasting vine. Jesus wondered at their rapid growth, their ripening in the burning sun, and their harsh winter pruning; he learned about apples, almonds and pomegranates, he saw figs swarming from rocks offering two, even three crops of dripping sweetness. When they began to put out leaves, as did the other trees, he knew that summer was here (Luke 21.30).'

### **Local Works**

CEL is a longstanding supporter of the Local Works campaign, which empowers us to reverse community decline and promote local sustainability. Last year the campaign succeeded in seeing the Sustainable Communities Act through parliament, shifting the balance of power from central government towards the local level. Now it is up to us to make sure the possibilities it offers are made concrete.

The Act aims to support local communities by keeping essential services open, encouraging small businesses and local food growing initiatives, and promoting renewable energy. Write to your councillors asking them to opt in to the Act, as well as to your local paper encouraging others to do the same. To date, over 20 authorities have opted in. Visit www.localworks.org.
